And something about him attracted me to him, I liked him, he seemed to be so doggone sincere. ^{Rife} He said to me I've just driven in from the east, from back New York state, he says, and he talked about the various states he had driven through. ^{Grading etc} ~~Ground~~ have to have this engine overhauled. ^{can} ~~So when I did I want to do it~~ with the utmost care, ^{well} and I said, you come the right place, I think I can give you what you want. And he was with this fellow was with Timkin, H. S. Timkin and pretty soon he got acquainted more and more, and pretty soon he said well I ^{have a} gotta Kittyhawk boat he says with a big six calinder Van Berg. I'd like to get the doggone thing out of the water and get it overhauled. Well I had this boat tow car with a boom on the end of it, and it was the only darn thing around that could back up to the edge of a wharf and pull anything out from a boat. It also served the purpose of lifting ^{out} several boxes of what was marked machinery from a destroyer, which turned out to be the nicest doggone Scotch Whiskey you ever tasted in your life. I did that for ~~Herb~~ Admiral Robertson. Any way to make a long story short I fixed the ^{Berger} Van Berger pulled it out and fixed it up. And Roy used to come down and play his French Horn, play on the guitar, and the mandilin or something and doggone he'd send those fellows into seventh heaven. He could play absolute perfect ~~in~~ those days and he could He started one day playing his French Horn, and a, he played "Rigoletto" oh what was it now. ~~not Rigoletts it was it had~~, it was in Rigolette, it was played in the El Trovetor, he also played a number of very wonderful pieces and the whole blasted block from one end to the other got up there and came in that thing in that garge, ^{etc} there must of been about a hundred people there before he quit. Then his eyes were just running water becuase he put his whole heart and soul into it. and also, from that time on he ^{why} became very fast friends, and every time I

I'm also gonna build a that was 13' 1913 I'm gonna build he says a he was livin g down the street he and his beloved little wife on ther other side of Market and 13th. There was some small homes down there. And a I'm gonna build a filiberty. This was in '14 when delivers began to come along and the minute that he saw any desig~~gs~~ of a new aircraft or anything he wanted to build it. He wanted to build a hull scutt liberty on a hisson and well he got the hull scutt built and I say it run and run good. A little bit of a thing about yea big just a small one about six inches in diameter . He had to make his own cilinder and spark plugs and his own carburator of couse along with every thing else. Grond his own springs for his va~~l~~ves , planning gear and everything And then it was that they came so do~~gg~~o~~ne~~ ~~amamibritee~~ of hisnobilities that I got to see him and found that he had a nice little place up there and first he had it he intended to get on that place on the corner. You know where you turn of on 4th street and make that little jog on Upus? On the left hand side there's a building there quite a large building is now a sort of rooming house at that time it ~~the~~ whole the whole dogonge area belongs to Timkin as servant quarters and the big house across the street with the iron railing around it belonged to Timkin as the home he l~~l~~ved in. And so when I got the engine overhauled I hauled it up and put it right ~~h~~ere, in the gar~~g~~e. And then later on Timkin built that place out there on Point L~~O~~m~~w~~. Then he moved out there well I followed him out there everynight I used to go and see him. Because there was so much we could talk about in each others lan- ugage that we seemed to understand and a we finally got to a point where I made a pretty steady ^{pilgrimage} clutter~~ers~~ ^{to} of the place and especially when it began to build ~~social-security-as~~ this miscope here he had ~~two~~ or three small microscopes something like the one they have at ~~the~~ Museum

in Washington D.C. any way at the Smitsonion ~~Am~~way he began to get pretty deeply involved bacteriology and he talk to me quite a lot about that He assembled alticlaves and began to get the stuff together of course which you've seen and I picked up my pretty nice little center fuge and he still had his wife when I saw him. And he had to make some bearings for the motor because it was a pretty nice bug motor and a every time I anything I ran across I let him know where it was or pick it up and give it to him. Now we became pretty fast friends as you can imagine Never thought anybody ~~any~~ from the monitary stand point he was just wonderful fun for me Then he developed this by the time he had this developed ~~he~~ course he had the big universal microscope then he developed also the ray by picking up various units he'd apply rich strongg bridges and a lot junk for years trying to get what he wanted he also was in very close contact with old man Stienwards. oh my very close contact Ald man Stiennuts shipped him out a thousand great big mass of tubes for his various units. Then Roy developed finally a means of testing the polarity of the material in the tubes and by doing that by matching the polarity of the filiments to the polarity of the pose, and a this he did by process of elimination at first he was able to develop a dadgum sight mor high frequency power than he ever had before Anything he had done before anything could mathh it ^{at all} before and then I could talk to you 20 years about these various things developments but I have to skip them I can't take the time because I don't want to be too long. and so he finally got to a point where from years of isolation and clarification and purification of these filterable forms he pure cultures of T.B. virus a various cancer viruses namelu carsinomus and a there were some pet~~h~~mus he was able to isolate He kept them absolutely pure He get a whole mass of guinea pigs and white rats and a so forth. inoculations I'll never for get it he's always called in enocelations he had two or three etiocincrees and his speech and that was one of them enocilation and a he finally got to the point where he could produce cancer in the

guinea pig in two weeks The virus was so potent that it would produce the cancer in two weeks. For instances he would produce a ^{Sarcoma} sycrono which is the termnus kind, which usually ^{is pretty well} contained in a sac and non-maglinante He could produce one of thoses kind fo growths in about the same time Sometimes inside of three weeks or a month to three months could produce depending on how you feed the animal a ^{sarcoma} sycorn a as big as all the rest of the ^{viscera} visru in the ~~main~~ ^{adominal} area Can he put this on the rat too? He tried it on rats guinea pigs and rabbits but he found finally that he could ~~donfine~~ confine his efforts to guinea pigs and white fats because every ~~dadgum~~ one was his pets and he ~~performed~~ performed the operations on them the most miticulous operations you ~~would~~ ever ~~want-to-see~~ ~~in~~ all your born ~~days~~. No doctor could ever come near to it at all. No doctor working on a little article ~~mass~~ of the viser of the human being where the in-stitines and everything else are so doggone big you know. It's so simple by compariso~~n~~ He had to wear himself a big powerful magnifying glass, to watch what he was doing, ^{he rigged it up} Of course he had this one he always threw down over this one eye., at times but he also ways always very busy with this big glass. He preformed the most wonderful operations you ever saw. Complete eradicating every tenticle out from the intestines , and sewed the thing upp and it got well and didn't know anything about it at all. Did it not once but hundreds of times. This is a thing that I wish that was published time and time again. I wish with all my heart that all the detailed information that he developed could be published because the ~~man~~ deserves ~~who~~ it even though he lost so many peoples friendship. During our case write he got went to the dogs from liquor that was re-commended for him to drink, anyway He finally got these cultures on the slide he could look through this thing here and you could see them swim-~~ming~~ around absolutely motile and active and then he'd say you wathh that ^{Ben} ~~ben~~ he'd go turn on the ^{light} ~~light~~ ^{power} ~~power~~ when it got to a certain point He'd release the whole doggone flood of ~~tax~~ ^{power} into the room of course he cracked

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a lot of glass in the other store house where he had all of his test tubes and stuff he ^{lost} dusted ^{a lot} all of the glass because he had such high frequency and vibrations that resonated exactly like the glass and as a consequence he lost a lot of good glass but to go back to the job I'd be looking at this and see all these little things swimming around I believe that last this deal was ready by 1923 and I believe that is when he got into his very active work of bacteriology. When he finally turned the juice loose why doggone little things would stop instantly you couldn't bat your eye quick enough in other words they would be agglutinated into one little mass of and it would instantly stop well he knew he had something so the minute he did that he would check his frequencies and do his level best to come to that frequency again then he found he couldn't get to it very well without making a lot of other expensive equipment to exactly locate the frequency and hold it and tie it down to a number because these frequencies are so high well he worked that way for quite a long time finally he got to a point where he would get several fellows around him the present of vice president of S.D. glass and paint co. Henry Seiner he was a nice fellow and so anxious to help and do all he could did Rife actually build these electronic instruments himself? Yes as far as I know and he built the microscopes himself he built the micro-manipulator himself and the micro dissector and a lot of other stuff and he built his equipment for taking his moving pictures did you ever see Lee DeForest down there in his lab? I remember him but not too well Philip Hoyland was in there quite a lot Hoyland was the one who in my estimation pulled the final~~y~~ boner which differently precipitated us into the courts What boner was that? well what I think is that Philip Hoyland developed some few items in the lab and I don't know what it was I always kept myself aloof from the pure end of things if there is anything I could learn or if there was anything I could do for him I did it but there's never a single cent of consideration anytime.

I do know Phil Hoyland seemed to help quite a lot and he got into to the bacteriology side with Rife a good deal because Rife had so many problems to work out. and he finally got to a point where he had to delegate some of the work and then pretty soon we were getting these meetings with the doctors from the New York State life from Mayo Brothers Dr. Rose now he used to spend a lot of time up there and then Dr. Kendall did Kendall work with the electronic instruments? No he didn't he'd study and watch what was going on and watch the results He'd see the results of the instruments being used. What year was that about '29 to '31 You see I had to gyrate around the place I had quite a business up there for quite a time and through the unfair treatment of a lady who bankrupted John the man who owned the entire block where the 4th and Maple service station sits El Prado you mentioned this Dr. Haymer Dr. Hamer he came into the picture after we built two of the machines to use as for lethal qualities in the human body without injuring the human body We leased them to him for so much a month and he also paid us \$20 a mo. to keep them calibrated now Philip Hoyland was pretty good on the oscilloscope and as a consequence he worked with these two machines to keep them in calibration he was an English Jew now I say that no with any malice against the Jews because I have had some wonderful Jews in my friendship in S.D. even Klabber Wagenheim two of the finest fellows I ever met they did business with me for years then they were the most wonderful fellows. You mentioned this case that got well was he an old man? Yea, Dr. Hamer had him he ran an average of forty cases a day through his place. He had to hire two operators he trained them and watched them very closely and the case histories were mounting up very fast amongst them of course was this old man from Chicago what did he have do you remember? He had a malignancy all around his face and neck and he was a gory mass Oh, it was terrible just a red gory mass. It had taken over all around his face it had taken off one eyelid at the bottom of the eye it had taken off the bottom of the lower lobe of the ear

and had also gone into the cheek area, nose and chin, and the sinus in the
 nostrum basin with the entire area involved He was a sight to behold in 6 mo.
 all that was left was a little black spot on the side of his face and the
 condition ~~was~~ of that was such that it was about to fall off Now that
 old man was 82 years of age honest to gosh I never saw anything like it It
 was pitiful, the delight of having a lovely clean skin again just like a babies
 skin to be healed of something that looked like he was going to be suffering
 for a long time to come. as its inroads developed why he went back to Chicago
 naturally he couldn't keep still and Fishbein heard about it Fishbein called
 him in and the old man was kind of ~~reluctant~~ about telling him about it and he
 made a lot about it Fishbein of course was unfair in doing so of course he
 will have to pay his debt later to the Supreme Creator for having done so he
 wined and dined him ~~trying-to~~ and finally learned ~~where~~ this machine was Well
 he got a hold of Hamm Realty Co. in L.A. and of course they are Jewish-German
 people and no doubt were well intentioned men the president of the Hamm Realty
 Co. came down and he had several meetings with us finally he took us out to
 dinner and stuff like that and he broached the subject about buying in the
 corp. well we couldn't do it and we wouldn't do it because we hadn't applied
 to the commissioner for permission to sell stock it was a closed corp. and we
 were doing very well and putting some money in the bank every mo. over and
 above expenses by quite a little bit because we were receiving further and
 farther around the renown was going farther as it spread we were getting orders
 and we weren't advertising a damn bit. But of course what did it was the
 case history of Dr. Hamer and he was so very honest about it he said that this
 was the most marvelous development of the age. He was one of the foremost
 surgeons in this doggone county and very well known on the Pac. coast that
 is with his work down at the Paradise ^{San} San. His case historys were absolutely
 wonderful well Dr. Couche took commander Benj. Harrison's wife she had a breast
 carcinoma the lower half of the breast was all eaten away and she suffered
 intense agony all of the time but she didn't want to have it operated. Because

her husband had told her that if she was ever operated she would die as sure as she was a foot high because of the metastasizing of the operation and spreading it out in the blood stream. Well he ~~hailed~~ haled her up perfectly and her breasts took on the normal shape she was a very well built person and when she realized that she had two normal breasts again it was to her a most marvelous thing didn't you mention that Shipero was the lawyer that Fishbein sent out here from Chicago? Shipero was engaged by Fishbein after it was possible for ~~this~~ and this I'm not going to say dead outright I still have not found anything yet to controvert this statement Philip Hoyland became disqusted with the whole deal because he was not getting what he felt was ~~his fair~~ his fair share of the stock which was fairly ~~divided~~ divided amongst all of us in spite of the fact that I had formed the corp. and had used my money to form the corp. and had spent mos. and ,mos. in L.A. doing it I didn't ask any more than the rest ~~of-th~~ Each of us received 6,000 shares of stock in the orginal corp. Hoyland didn't think he was getting a satisfactory deal and so he felt he wanted to ~~show~~ show his oats a littl bit and a like Hitler and Musileny and Stalin and that gang they tried to find out somebody who is dissident and a bribe them to become stooges for them. Well the Hamm Realty Co. at the instigation of Fishbein bribed Hoyland to become a stooge. With the result we were kicked into Judge Kelly's court and also they asked a receiver to be appointed which I knew what would happen we would end up with a defficiency judgement ~~aggggggggg~~ and I could work for the next 10 years at hard labor to pay off On what grounds did they bring it into court? That the corp. first was operating without a lieense and ~~that-the~~ many other ramifications Now you mentioned that this Judge offered to fight these peopl? Judge Kelly offered to fight for the honor of the Co. and actually the case was kicked into a straight out and out deal with the A.M.M. He offered to defend my case against them. But I was broke I had so doggone much of it that After a year and 3 days I was so flat that I tee- picked up a few tools I had and went down to the back door of Convair and got me a job in a machine shop. I stayed there for a few mos. in the machine slop and I kind of lost faith in human nature for awhile. Bert Comperes defended us wonderfully if it hadn't been for

Bert we would have been socked in jail for the rest of our lives and we were not guilty in anyway shape of form. However it worked out finally and it cooked our goose completely and we just closed up shop. ~~We had a carp~~
 What happened to Rife after that? Well Rife was called into testify ^{three} ~~three~~ ~~or~~ times as you know and Judge Kelly was a wonderful man and Rife had never been in court and he just became a nervous jibbering idiot. In that he couldn't stand it and he did his best to keep calm his hands shaking like a leaf of course he had started ~~smoking~~ pretty heavily and inhaling it which he didn't use to do before. He knew that smoking was not good for the lungs because he had shown us the actual~~ly~~ reaction in the lung cell and the effect on the flagellates etc. anyway he took to drinking because the doctor couldn't find anything to stop his nervousness without forcing him into a drug addict. He thought the next best thing was to just give him a little wine and brandy and he would be alright. First he didn't like the taste of it but the body is a fearfully made thing and it will accommodate to poisons that the human being wills it should be taken internally finally he got so he had to crave it then of course no matter how many times I tried to get him tied in the factories Lordy Ryan was so anxious to have him build them some of these viewing machines to see the under side of the spot welding machines I was the chief engineer on the development of that project under Paul Matherly. Then I went over to Narmco with Paul where I am now. What happened to Rife ~~then~~ in-between the time that this trial occurred and that time? Well he was quite discouraged and he got to selling off a piece and a piece there. To keep his drinking habit up and his little wife was calling me up won't you come over and talk to him. Of course I was hard pressed to make a living at times. I had five years of good work at Convari I got out of that when I could get into a pretty good aviation business I went broke on that with another gang they used the funds set aside for taxes and etc. they abused their privileges and used funds they shouldⁿ'T have used and the Govt. has been after them ever since. I was the instructor in a school called the Southern Skys of Aeronautics and being honest you get into pretty doggone

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fully places some times, and a honest person always gets used until he gets hep. A honest person will be honest regardless you can't help yourself and we finally broke that deal up and we went into something else later on. Finally I ended up by going to see my old ~~best~~ buddy Earl Prudden at Ryan. He was a very close friend of mine for 40 years. Actually I was forced into it I had built me a home up on the hill from borrowed money where I am now. And I had to go to work to get pay for it of course Earl had been waiting for me for 25 years He invited into the corp. when there was only him and T. Claude Ryan. I didn't come because I thought I had this dirigible deal which I want to keep out of the picture at this time. ~~When~~ Ben, can you recall any of the case historys other than this old man that Hamer had down there? Oh! My, my yes, we would go in there and see rectial cancers and stuff of that sort. ~~We'd see~~ Did he clean those up? He cleaned them up completely, absolutely clean. People would come in there with syphilis not for that purpose but those that had developed cancers he'd find that they had syphillis also or gonorreah. By golly it would clean those up completely not a doggone taint of it ~~in~~ in the blood stream at all. Clinically cured. I would go down to Dr. Hamere and he would very painstakingly pull out these case historys showing the improvement day by day of every one of them some were slower than others. What about T.B.? T.B. was cleaned up in a number of cases he didn't have as many T.B. cases. Old DR. Yale he stole the deal for awhile. He gave Roy to much Whiskey and made an ass of him again. ~~Burn~~ It burns me up all these people however Yale is where he has got to realize now. Since he is dead and he is worst off now than he ever dreamed he'd be because now he has his conscience he has to live with. And you can't hide behind anything because he tried to steal the deal from Rife. He had T.B. cases and he cleaned up some of them up there. At his place on the plaza I used to be in and out of there all the time. Rife used to work with him down there didn't he? He roped him into a point where Rife practically had to. Rife was always looking for help because

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he still had the ardent desire to see his machine get into use. Although during his clear moments when he wasn't under the influence of liquor he would endeavor to progress but every dadgum day at a certain time he would go and get one little nip out of his car and that was the end of it. From that time on he became modulant. Useless as tits on a boar for the rest of the day. Rife told me that Yale used to take care of all the prostitutes down on the other side of Market St. He had a lot of Syph . cases and he cured a lot of them up. He cleaned them right up. There were so many of them in there that I didn't like my wife to go around his place, because they were hard characters. He told me also that Yale was unclean in his work and he gave some guy an injection and it killed him the next day/ and after that Rife took all his stuff out of there and moved out. That was time when Yale had to lie himself to beat the band. The D.A. office was under his thumb one thing about Yale he always anticipated trouble because of that ~~heppppppppppppp~~ before trouble occurred he got to know all of these men one of the boys in the D.A.s office had a wife who was suffering very terribly and Yale got the person so she could get back to normal health again. Of course this guy in the D.A.s office became his slave. Never charged him a nickel for it and in that way he always built himself a pretty good background of help anytime he needed it. That was the only way he got off from that killing. This is the first time I have mentioned that to anybody and now that he is dead I can't do him any harm. The less I think about it the better I am off. My wife was very unhappy because when I got into court I couldn't make a living and I lost every dadgum nickel I put into this thing. It cost me \$3200 in cash you said you lost you're house didn't you? I lost the ~~place~~^{home} at the corner of Mackinely and Redwood a beautiful place. I had just a few payments to make on it but I couldn't pay them and after the trial I didn't have the money so I lost it. Believe me that was a tough deal. Well I won't stay much longer because I have a lot to do. However be that as it may I have been very, very sorry about Roy. Time and time again I have a chance to bring him in to Ryan When I was at Convair I met the boys and Convair and would take them

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up to his lab. I first met him in '50 he had a drafting set down there on display at Rodney Stokes that was the finest drafting set I ever saw and I wanted that. It took me about three trips out there before I bought it from him. And everytime I would go out there he would tell me about this that had gone in the past you know and that's what brought me into it and I became interested and decided to prove it out for myself. Well of course later on we formed the sea-water conversion outfit and let Roy come into the picture on that and he was developing fairly well, but at that time continued application of the liquor. I would get there at 10a.m. and he would be just as bright and deper as he can be it would be wonder ful. But about noon He'd excuse us and slip out to his car that would be the end of it so that when he would come back he had a smell on his breath. My sense of smell is very keen. I may look old and I am old and I'LL be 69 next, second day of next month. But, since I stopped smoking in 1945 When I saw what he had on the slides. and watched the effect of smoke in lung cell wathced the fagilates lay down and wathhed the loss of oxygen infiltration inthe infatig glands and into the blood stream through the lung cells and then saw how weary those fagilateswere these flagela were in coming back up into the cells when you shoot oxygen into and exhaust the smoke I learned something that no one has every taken away from me and I knew I was not a somker. I stopped it instantly I took all my cigars and gave them away at Convair and the fellows I give them to are all dead at far as I'm-~~concerned~~-now know now. I know that Capt. Loyld Learner who was then the Capt. of the guards of Convair at that timeThen since the time I have obtained a very keen sense of smell at my age. And also and I say this good my memory is good in many aspects of course cases where I have so much to recall like this deal here I can'T recall one millionth part of it right now I could if I were ith you long enough to find out By the way I'll say this though it would have been nice if you would have let me know you were taking this pape recording of these statements because this is more of a little underhanded deal If you had told me about it

I would have been happy to cooperated with you , I would have given you more detail about him than to ~~have~~ give you detail of the I'm more intereste in you. I like this cold turkey because it's really better because it does nt have a put on attitude I have no ax to grind I would love to see We have historical recorés here from Dr. Couche from Dr. Stafford in the hospital who has used one of these instr. recently In fact I've got about 30 hours now historical data Did you ever hear of Dr. Drapsel ~~Waal~~ Grausel had inas a patient up there in that brown stucco ~~house~~ on 6th Ave. I see the place has been turned into some other kind of arrangement now. Anyway he had a very ~~very~~ important case Of course he had th wife on a very I can't recall his ~~name~~ now but I think he was one of the sec. of tres. in the earky Roosevelt era or the I think it was possibly in the Pres. Hoover's time However she was dying of a very serious condition she had terrific fevers They couldn't reduce them had tried everything and they called on us If we couldn't quickly transport one of out portables up there and het it placed and give her a t~~re~~atment The doctor characterized it I have forgotten ~~now~~ what it was if it was unglent fever or what it was it was acting like unglent fever of the worst type and he called I wish I could rememver the lady's name I would reconize it instantly if I saw it but he called us in and we got the machine up there we had to use a doily to get itup elevator shaft and etc. Turned it on her and gave ~~her~~ a good bathing with ~~the~~ currant We gave her several freqs. which operate best on fevers in 15 min. her fever began to subside and by the next day she had no fever and a the doctor pre- scribed the nurshing diet and so forth and what ever p~~re~~scribetions he used at that time and it wasn't too long before whe was well The fever began to subside within 15 min from the time they quit~~d~~ that treatment that I can tel you as honest as I'm setting here Then there was another Dr. I forgo to his name now I know him so well. There are a large number of them in S.D' here. Drs. who had to do with hydro-therpy and phisics where they could work this in without beingscalled Charlotons you know anyone who had one of these med. men was either told to get ~~read~~ rid of it right now since we started our

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case in court. Judge Kelley's court. Or else he would lose his membership in A.M.A. and that's what forced Dr. Hamer out of it. Then of course he returned his two machines back to us and we had to cover him on his expenses but that of course eventually took place with all of them that is what ~~shut~~ shut us down. What happened to all of the machines then, who has got them all? I don't know I said well this is the end of it for me I'm gonna get me a job. Dr. Couche kept on with his machine in an office there in the Timkin Bldg. Electric bldg. now up on one of the top floors. then once in awhile if I had a little something wrong with me I would go up and see him. The reason we didn't get sued for a mal practice was because we had asked Dr. Couche to efficate every one of the applications of this machine to anyone. We had a little girl her name is Laurnel Drapple she is in S.D. now Drapple Francisco blifus Co. and her father was Frank Drapple and she was a chum of my daughter in school she was a beautiful little singer she had a lovely voice but she couldn't sing too long because the dropping into the throat would cause her to have difficulty in getting rid of it she had a tarel situation which is what we called it then. They call it Sinus now Chronic Sinus she did have a lot of difficulty ~~in the~~ both in the frontal sinuses and in the antrum bases Dr. Couche gave her the treatments in our offices on the 6th floor of the old Broadway Bldg. and she became so thoroughly completely cured that she could sing beautifully after that and there's a lot of history I could tell you back of that but that is beside the point. That's a case I watched get well in the space of about 6 treatments possibly might of been ten but we gave her those treatments because she was a close friend of mine., and my daughter Frank Drappel until he passed on was ever grateful for me on that account. Of course it didn't hurt me any and I have no conscience that bothers me at all. Well, many cases I have forgotten but if I were to set down and think for along time I could think up a lot of cases of those cases that were up there in Pet Lomas One man had developed petlomas around the neck here and eaten away so bad that there were cords and bones of the neck were bare. Why, that case was a remarkable case Roy used his clinic machine for that

His original machine Did Henry Stiner see any of these cure? ~~I don't see~~ why
There's no reason why he shouldN'T have done he was there in the lab all of
the time. He spent a lot of time in the lab. The point is this, this fellow
the pictures ~~to~~ show how that fellows neck came back to normal. It was a
little bit pitted the skin was but other than that it was perfect. That was
watched by Dr. Milbank Johnson, Dr. Authur I. Kendall, Dr. Rosehow those three
Dr. Gerner was in from Montreal Can. but Dr. Gerner became a little bit scared
of himself he was afraid to state what he knew. He lost his nerve. One of
these best machines was sent up to Dr. Gerner and he wrote me a letter and
said he was afraid to use it and had given it to a Priest up therewho was a
radio ham and could use the spare parts. It is pityful that double dial machin
the light wouldn't work. Do you know anything about Spiritualism? Very little
Well, I don't want to scare you ~~to~~ death would you like to know who is beside
you right now? I don't mind. Well Dr. Couche is right beside you right now
~~he is~~ flashed a blue light on me three times so I had to reconize him. ~~God~~ ^{God} ~~th-~~
bless the dear old soul because I loved him very ~~much~~ ^{much}. He was a very grand
gentleman in the body and of course he still remains in the spirit he is a
very very powerful man . I think about him very often. Well then you can
understnad why he is around you now. however that of course is another story.
I'm a spiritualist one that believes in the true story that Jesus taught when
he came on the earth plain and I rty to live just as he taught. He was the
formost spiritualist of this world everything He did was spiritualism . So we
go back from that. There was one thing I wanted to see about this clinic in
LaJolla in 1934 that Milbank Johnson had I didn't check into it very much. I
was up there once and saw the place and the old Ellensby Scripps home that wss
prior this machine used in the development of our machinery He used his clini-
cal machinery , equipment to produce the high freq. that were current at that
time. I understand that this was sponcered by a special research committee
of the U.S. Cal. That I believe is true that I think is ture, yes, I'm pretty
certain that that is true because If you go up to the U. now you know there
are no records they have very carefully destoryed them. It was so contorversal

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they were scared to death. You see Roy airagated hisself some certain very wonderful shall I say degrees. Which were pressionable I ~~never~~ don't know if they were or they weren't. Those that thought they knew a were quite outspoken about it But I personally didn't bother me a particle. There was a period of time at the first World War I think it was around 1918 Roy was supposedly in the Secret ~~Service~~. Do you know anything about that? That I have never been able to controvert. Q. He was a special aide to the Pres. That I've nver been able to check or complemate. As such he was able to go all over the world. He seemed to know so much about the country that I used to drive around over there all over Frande, Italy, and Sweterser~~land~~ and all around. And he knew towns that I knew in fact he would mention in order to check them up. He won't say anything about this period but he told me that serval p~~ae~~ple were excuted on this death line. That of course is possible. And so as a conquence I never and I took it for what it was worth. I believed him because there were times when he would talk in terms that I would understand. In these hundreds of little towns that I visited in France and Elsis Lorene parts of ~~Germany~~ Germany and Italy and Switerland and etc. Now ~~on-the~~ I want to go back to this clinic again did you ever see Alvin G. Ford there? ~~Q~~(the pytholosis) Yes, I met the man but never had much to do with him. He was suppose to be the phytholose for this special research committee, according to Rife, now I wondered if you. Now, I met the man who was introduced to me as ~~the~~ this man Ford. But personally didn't know him very well. I spent most of my time after my supper until midnight or two o'clock in the ~~morning~~ with Roy because he was working out his formulas and things of that sort and I was more or lees wathcing ~~him~~ him from the mechanical side because mechanics are my main fort. Because we were we had a chumminess and a friendlyness in common that was not actually born of the high techinal information which he was d~~ave~~loping So there were times when I didn't bother to get into the picture at all. and it was only again when I began to see whether we could d~~o~~ anything about salt water conversion that and again after sevral years of not having a chance to see him and of course it

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 has been spreadic ~~since~~ back and forth since that time and of course until his little wife died I used to try and get out to say hello to her, my wife and she were very very friendly. She was one of the sweetest souls I ever met. and I don't believe there is anybody any nicer than Mrs. Rife I don't care what nationalitty they are. Well, I've run a little bit low on what I can think of right now what I'll have to do is if you want to carry this on futher I'll have to start breaking out. I want to show you a little publica-tion I have, this sort of its on both sides. It shows a pictoral history of this thing. This is the old freq. instr. I reconize a lot of that also. Here's one of the first machine we build. This one is still in use. It is used by Dr. Tulley downtown there on Logan Ave. He bought it from Dr. Couch and he has cured serval cancer cases with it. Cured all kinds of perrerea trench mouth and he is in his dental practice you know. It seems like this has been done many many ~~time~~ times and all of the small items we didn't think much about. You see what Rife was so anxious to do was develope the ability to prodcast the high freq. over a large area through the means of KFM You see this ray of current is thrown out through the tube by another ray and carrier ray and because of that he found that it would be possible to broadcast that same rya. and everyone within a certain radius would receive a free healing treatment say a certain freq. fo r cancer and etc. He was certainly and idealist honest to God for it makes me so sick when I think about Roy how he has gone now and how we really and truly. We only have one error here on the microscopes this microscope was suppose to built in 1920 but I had it down as 1930. I checked with Roy on it. This actually was one that he used for the means of taking motion pictures and is a very low magnification microscppr. compared to this one here. This one has beer up to 62,000. Have you ever verified that? Well, I have worked with it locked myself into the seat at 52,000 but I wasn't to capable of holding myself still. You do have to hold yoursefl still I've seen Roy set in the doggone seat with out moving wathcing your changes in your freq. in his machine wathcing when the time would arrive when the virus would that is

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the virus in the slide. a glumate so if would diffintly reprove a certian
 req. 24 hours is ~~nothing~~ for him 48 hours he had done it many times sit there
 without moving. Right straight through? Yes not even drinking he wouldn't evne
 touch anything accept a little water maybe all ~~of~~ the time. His nerves were
 just like cold steel he never moved his hands never quivered. Of course he would
 train before hand and go through a very careful workout over ^{to} build himself up
 again. Bit that is what I would call one of the most magnificent sights of
 human control I'd ever seen and indurance. It's wonderful If you have ever sat
 underneath a lot tied to a seat and have someone drip spot of water on you for
 a little while you would understand what I mena That's the way they sat people
 crayz a numbers of years ago. Does 1920 seem about right for the first Micro-
 scope or before that? Just about '20 is right because up until that time he had
 not bothered to much about it. He talked about it , he talked about bacteriology
 way back 1913 but he was busy with MR. Timkin he actually was a chuffer then
 at later they hired a chauffer so he could confine all of ~~his~~ efforts to his
 work. You know he saved Mrs. Timkin from death of a very very serious condition.
 She was becoming poisoned from food that was in her refrigator. He made a very
 careful analysis and found out what the trouble was. The doctores didn't know
 but he stopped it right then and there. She used to come over after she got well
 and sgy well, Roy I understand you've got some more experiments to do how much do
 you think you'll need for these experiments will \$30,000 do? Just like that.
 She walked over to him one day with a cane apparently she had had an injury at
 some time and walked with a cane. And she came over and she said thoses very
 words in my hearing and he said, "Well, thank you very much. I'll be over to see
 you a little later. I'll be over for your treatment a little later on." He
 always sent over when the doctor was there to make sure the doctor preformed the
 proper treatment. She relied on Roy absolutely ~~implicity~~. Of course he had
 he use of the home if he wanted it and of course he had nice quarters over the
 garage. Very lovely quarteres You see he has a strip illumination picture here
 He used all of that of course dark field ~~elimination~~ slit illumination inverse
 light illumination and practically everything under the sun, in that one machine

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It's a wonderful machine. I can't remember all that we used to do with it. but now it would come back to me of course if I talked long enough. You've actually seen the cancer virus over the universal microscope. I have seen cancer viruses, I have seen polio virus I seen the polio virus instantly change from the model to what we can gluanation. I've seen the T.B. virus. You see you take and inoculate an animal with ^{it} let's say a T.B. rod or the bacteria. It's takes a long time to come down with the T.B. Give him a dose of T.B. virus and he is down in two weeks, often times earlier. And the same thing applies to the polio viruses and of course there are a large number of those. Roy didn't isolate all of them but he showed many of these people, old Dr. Dingham come over there one time ~~and~~ as many others did. He would show them the whole story, he was so anxious to have this information passed on. And the colossal ignorance of the ~~Dr.~~ He said Well, Uhm, its interesting if true, saw it with his own naked eyes and then said interesting if true And that would be the ^{total} intelligence, of the average doctor. That was the reason that I got to the point that I couldn't see anything of the average doctor. Most of them would spend a few years looking at a microscope and all they would ~~see~~ pass, they would have a set of a few small microscopes with a magnification of a ~~few~~ 1200 diameters would pass in front of them and see what this kind of bacteria would look like, what T.B. rod would look like. They never saw virus and ~~that~~ they had to image it they could see it. They just had to imagine all of these things. And here was a man showing people showing Drs. these viruses of many different kinds of diseases, especially these three deadly ones T.B., polio, and cancer. And what do they say "Hum, interesting if true." It went clear over their heads it was too much for them. And they were our medical men who were suppose to be taking care of our health. I haven't had to go to a doctor Thank God for a long time. I don't intend to. If I cultivated the friendship of one it would be the fact on the friendship side and not because I wanted to go and be treated at all. And I have kept well ever since I quit smoking and been very well indeed An occasional cold once every 3 or 4 or 5 years and then I've only had one cold in 8 years

This one cold was over two years ago., and that's the way I like to keep. I thank the good Lord that I'M It isn't me that's doing it because I'm just a little skinny runt of 118 lbs. That is what I weighted this morning striped. But at the same time this is some of the information, I wish I could give you more. But it just doesn't come to me. You saw the publications made by the Journal of the Franklin In. didn't you? Yes I saw that, I know all about that Time and time again since that time some of these medical men have made the proud discovery that they had isolated we will say one of the viruses ~~that~~ of Cancer, had isolated one of the viruses of polio. Why ~~that~~ was one of the most ridiculous things in the world 35 years ago Roy Rife showed them these things. And Dr. Gruner saw them, and Dr. Authur I. Kendall saw them, and Dr. Roseenhow Roseinhow was a very fine fellow and he belived in Roy and so did Dr. Milbank Johnson It's a pityful thing to as far as this ~~thing~~- saying goes you don't ammount to a tinker's cuss in your own country or words to that effect. Well these doctors out here they thought Rife ~~is~~ they still called him a chauffeur like some people call me a mechanic and I've been an engineer for many years. and a teacher for many years . I taught the aviation machiners school for 3 years 15 mo. over there at Naval Air Station. ^{during the war} ~~No more,~~ we put it on its feet before we sent the whole 10,000 students of Oklahoma. And its a funny thing, people don't think much of you in your own country. Its a shame. It was a shame with Roy and Its a pity because in this room here, why you have stuff here now, if used the way it should be used and if one of these machines was to be reworked and thoroughly analyzed by the abiltites that he possessed at ~~that~~ time, we could start the proposition going again which would again demonstrate that you could cure cancer and all crazy notions of usurping the rights of the AMA ^{to the profession} notwithstanding. They definitely could take a leaf out of Roy Rifes book and do an awfull lot of good to this world for sickness and disease. I agree. As a consequence we have lost millions of people that could have been healed by Rifes machine. Look at Dr. Quigley, a fellow of the college of surgeons for 40 years who wrote a book and retired, a very

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wonderful doctor, he spoke about the tremendous cost in Cancer. Well let me give you a book from Dr. Lee, it is a copy of Rife's publication about the Universal microscope by the Journal of the Franklin Institute. I know Dr. Lee, he was quite an inventor. These books are available at 25 cents a copy, he has preserved some of Rife's knowledge. That is a strange thing because I was sort of an understudy for Dr. Lee in regard to nutrition. I took on a nutritional supplement here in the State of Cal. I developed a lecture service here in 5 counties. I did fairly well but you can't make much money at it because people don't want to be healed. They don't care to be healed. They like to dissipate the way they like to dissipate. If they like a lot of coffee, they drink a lot of coffee. If they want to smoke, there is no way in the world to stop them from smoking unless they come to a point where a doctor says you'll have to stop smoking or else go in a pine box. The point is this - our creator never made smoke to purify our blood stream and it is purified by oxygen and when the flagellates lay down they don't get rid of the carbon dioxide on one hand and they can't develop the intake of oxygen to turn the blood from blue to red as it passes through the lungs. I learned that so I have cut it out and I have to fight it all the time because I get a lot of second hand smoke down at the factory. If we get this thing going a gain would you want to pitch in and help some more or have you decided - I just don't know what good I would be I don't know how long it will be before I can leave the factory because I have a little more to pay on my home - a matter of a couple thousand dollars more and I'd like to stay long enough to clean that up and then retire and then if there happened to be something I could do to make a little something on the side with my social security why it would be something I could enjoy. Fine. I like Roy Rife. I'll always remember Roy as my ideal. He has a tremendous knowledge and a tremendous capacity for remembering what he has learned. He definitely was my ideal - outside of old Teddy Roosevelt, he was my ideal and that's the reason I enjoyed being in his company so much all the time. It later was sickening to see the man suffer from his own inability to stop the drink - other than that in his lucid moments, I don't know of any many smarter

than him and Ill bank him up against a hundred doctors because hedid know his tuff with his scmentific knowlegge in so many lines. Look at the beautiful guns he used to make. I watzhed him make a gun, watched him make fishing rods, watched him build a model of a racing shell and a racing shell. I watched him do some fast work with it and saw him do some tremedous work with it back at Yale and some other places and there were so many things. He built so much. Look at the beautiful lenses that he builit where you could take 3D pictures with one single kind of a lens and all this stuff that he developed. He had so many wrinkles that he could have cashed in and made millions out of if he had wanted to and I do mean millions of dollars. Which would have benefitted the human race, irrespective of this tremendous thing that he built that we call the Rife ray machine. I have always liked Roy and with all of his faults, I love him still. Did he ever produce that big log of all the information that he ~~produced~~ (recorded) about each bacteria. Yes we have the book - there it is.

ine and dandy - I recognize it now because that tells a story of so many of the characteristics of each doggone virus and each doggone bug that he examined. The job where he arranged those hookworms all together in line with the micro-manipulator and then took a picture of them and enlarged them so you could see them at a million times. My gosh, that was a wonderful job in itself and then ~~wh~~ when he took that embryo and encased it in a case of wax and made those micro-d disecctions of it which were so doggone thin that you could look throught the whole thing. A perfect little embryo. We have some pictures on the wall of those here now. Of course what I know about it was just simply the history. We have a lot of values on electronics that dont mean anything in that book because nobody can even correlate them. Thats the biggest problem. We tried to get Beth Wilman to help him to write a book and of course they started trouble with him because they tried to tell people that he became enamored of the girl and he wasnt. In my estimation, Roy was one of the most gentle, gentile, self-effacing moral man I ever met. Not once in all the years I was going over there to the lab and that was approximately thirty years, did I ever here him say one word out of place. Did the Beam Ray Corp ever get any of these exact

frequencies that were used? Philip Hoyland was supposed to have them. And he Hoyland began to develop miserly and he wouldn't pass them on to others and he thought he had a lever and he wouldn't pass them on to others so that they could calibrate the machines. It became a dog eat dog game and that's how it got kicked into the receivership - we didn't go into receivership, they developed an injunction about us using the machines in the operating business and so we had to defend ourselves and we came out with a clean slate. Judge Kelly gave us a completely clean slate in spite of the array of legal talent they marshalled against us - with only one man, Bert Comperet on the other side nevertheless Beam Rays Corp came out with a clean slate but I came out broke and I went to work at Convair and stayed there a few months as a machinist then they said it would be better if I had a machine shop for myself and do all the experimental work for them so they gave me a nice big room next to the test lab and I went around the factory and gathered up all the nicest machines I could find and I just enjoyed myself there. Then one day Bob Williams who used to be the foreman of the machine shop came to me and said, "Ben, Walter Thatcher from the vocational training school wants to see you" and I knew Walter because I had taught in vocational and he said Ben, I want you to go over to the naval air station and head up the aviation machinist mate school curriculum and see if you can't get things going. Well I stayed there 15 months and passed about 7000 boys through my hands. Then they wanted to make me senior instructor back in Norman, Okla. because I had passed all exams, I was associate instructor while I was here. My mother and my mother-in-law were both in the hospital so I couldn't leave my wife to have to take care of them both so I decided to go back to Convair and went back in as an engineer. They couldn't put me in the machine shop again because I knew too damn much they said. So I worked as an engineer and I proved that I knew more about engineering than I had said anything about and I stayed with them until 45 as a liaison engineer and then quit. Then I went to work for Ryan in 52. I was with Rife at the time this Ryan deal came thru and as I understand it he was to do this work but when it came down to actually hire him they never did it. No I'll tell you why. One of the big troubles with Roy

is that he would sometimes take a little nip to steel his nerves and the fellows own there - I brought him into the plant myself and I arranged all of the meetings with the officials, I cant remember all of their names now. You see I was the engineer on the panel for the development of the spot welding program, for the KC130 and the ~~Amesing~~ 707. I brought him in because they talked about closed circuit television. to see the under spots. There was too much abberation there and tooo much difficulty there to be dure you had the right kind of a deal and it took them a long time to finally perfect it. They did however finally perfect it and they use them in closed circuit TV now but it cost them a lot of money. And the system that Roy had developed ~~was~~ would have been a series of prisma and mirrors to magnify the sspot and to maintain its true relative value from the visual standpoint and it would have been a much cheaper deal but we would have needed several machines see - several of these units. Weell, I warned Roy - dont touch the kiquor at least until you are hrough and out of here. Well the smell on his breath made them hesitate, hesitate long enough, even though they requested him to produce drawings, rough drawings. When I brought him in the 2nd time he had another smell on his breath and I knew it was all over. And Bob Fullerton, who was then chief of electrical welding systems and Palmer the chief of industrial engineering, etc, I had all of these big boys in the plant and they were ready to give him the contract for about \$25,000.00 . But by golly, I did my level best to keep him away from them so they could not smell his breath ~~cause~~ cause my sense of smell is keen. Instantly of course it reflected, they didnt say much about it made them hesitate and think and finally Geo Swabb who the 2nd in charge of the ind. engr. group said - well lets try one of these TVs. They tried it and it didnt work too well but they went a little further and they finall went to TV. That made me sick because I thought at least again I had a chance to get Roy into something where he could make some money. These men from convair, all of the lab groups, the development groups, I had some of the biggest men from convair, Johnny Wainwright who was then chief of the PBY group and Bill Sandcook and Frank Fink and the whole gang were over there but he fell down

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because he got mottled - started to tell that he never took a cent for it and that used to get him, hed get to the point where he would say that he never took a cent ~~for~~ for anything that he ever did which he didnt do and then hed get mottled and he would turn away and the tears would come down his face. Well if he took a deep breath to recover from the sob why hed breathe out and they would catch the liquor and that was the end of it. So they walked away. Thats the pitiful part about this whole doggone deal and thats why Roy has been a victim of circumstances which ~~was~~ were not of his own making. They definitely were not of his own making. Well it looks like the AMA has put their mark on him alright just like they did on the other doctors using his instruments - apparaently they brain washed them all. They put their mark on him alright. Hammer is a whipped boy you know - he doesnt say anything any more. Well yes, he was very well indoctrinated. I think Kendall was paid off about \$200,000. He went down deep into Mexico and he bought a ranch to that tune and the mexicans cleaned him out of that so he is living off his soninlaw today in La Jolla. Its a strange thing how the cause and effect really act in peoples lives. Now, Ive lived long enough to see it happen so many times and I warn people, when they start cussing around me, when they try to pull something phony and say oh well nobody will know about it, why I warn them, that there is no way of keeping this information unavailable - some people will never here it as long as they live. We had this up in fron of the public health board here a year ago and Kendall wrote a letter to the board stating that he had never seen the ray used. Oh rot. Can you beat that? You mean Arthur I Kendall? Yes. I have his letter here. Well I never would have believed or thought that a man would become such a prostilite. I never did either. Or would shall I say debase his own intelligence. Upon this this letter, I base the obvious fact that he was paid off. He must have been. There is another man that did the same thing - Karl Meyer, of the Hooper Foundation in San Francisco. He doesnt remember being on the Special Medical Research committee of USC etv. I heard of him - yes but I didnt know much about Karl Meyer. We made a liar out of him too. Well they used to beat a

pathway to Rifes lab door and that was a beautiful lab at one time. We have moving pictures of it here. It was so beautifully arranged inside. The equipment was just exactly right and the operating equipment, his study was just wonderfull. It was a place of relics and the atmosphere could not be duplicated anywhere.
